This template can be used for multiple purposes:

- It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sports premium
- It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sports premium
- It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spending, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

Your grant must be used effectively and based on school needs.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.** 

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourage schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

To address this, we have organized a 6-week catch-up program to ensure that everyone gets back on track.

No	Regrettably, our teachers and staff have not received any professional development training in swimming. Nonetheless, we are committed to exploring this matter further to enhance their understanding in relevant areas.
